Background

On September 15, 2017, the State Historic Preservation Office announced a grant opportunity through the Historic Preservation Fund for Certified Local Governments. The Planning and Community Development Department received and processed five applications. The state's application deadline is October 31, 2017.

Analysis

All applications have been supported by the Sitka Historic Preservation Commission. Four applying entities are non-profit organizations and have been determined to meet federal eligibility requirements. The fifth application was submitted by an individual and thus does not meet the requirements to be a sub-recipient of federal funds.

Due to risk of violating federal code regarding federal award requirements, a sub-recipient of federal funds must be either a non-profit organization or a government. A business or individual would be considered a contractor, and CBS would violate not only federal guidelines, but its own procurement procedures if it passed on federal funds to a contractor. Sole-proprietors cannot perform both roles of sub-recipient and contractor without creating a conflict of interest, thus resulting in the violation of municipal, state, and federal procurement requirements. Violation of state or federal grant administration law can result in CBS losing the opportunity to utilize such grant programs in the future.

If awarded, a municipal subgrant agreement must be signed prior to commencement of the project. The subgrant must follow all applicable federal, state, and city requirements regarding procurement, entity status, and reporting. Qualified historic preservation professionals must be consulted throughout the project as directed by the State Historic Preservation Office.

Fiscal Note

PROJECT INFORMATION

1. PROJECT DESCRIPTION

This project is to continue the rehabilitation of the Japonski Island Boathouse, following complete historic Rehabilitation design documents approved by the SHPO, with walls and roof and ramp for an accessible entry and toilet addition.

This phase will construct the addition's shell (walls and roof). Previous projects will have restored and insulated the wall of the existing building where the addition will attach, and built a concrete foundation for the addition with service entries for electric, water, sewer and communications.

This portion of the project will build walls and roof according to our approved historic rehabilitation design documents. It will have a door and deck and ramp. Windows will be framed in but installed at a later date. Insulation, interior finishes and furniture will also be installed later.

Preservation aim: The Sitka Maritime Heritage Society is rehabilitating the Japonski Island Boathouse to federal historic preservation standards to serve community residents and visitors as a working Maritime Heritage Center. This public, working heritage center will have restored haul-out facility, boat shop, hands-on interpretive exhibits and classroom space, and an interpretive facility for the Sitka Naval Operating Base and U.S. Coastal Defenses National Historic Landmark. The goal is to be a valuable part of community preservation of heritage and education, as well as an important visitor attraction, contributing to Sitka's economy. It is an important feature of the historic landscape of Sitka and of this National Historic Landmark.

Scope: The current project scope involves four elements:

Number one is to have a contractor construct the walls and roof of the accessible entry/toilet addition, according to construction documents for Rehabilitation of the building, by NorthWind Architects, approved by the SHPO. Rigid insulation will be installed with the roof, but the rest of the walls and roof will be the shell only. Windows will be framed in, but not installed at this point. An entry door will be installed.

Second, the gable wall where it is exposed above the addition will be insulated and will get a layer of sheathing and new siding, identical to the original on the building (per construction documents).

Third, volunteers will build the deck, stairs and accessible ramp and handrail, per construction documents. This will also include any work on the existing building that will be harder to access once the deck is built, including repairs to siding.

The fourth element is public education. The deck and ramp and wall repair will be built through volunteer work parties, where we will share the principles of historic preservation, as well as practical methods of adding infiltration barrier and weather proofing, while preserving the look and feel of a historic building. We will also hold an open house, featuring the construction documents and tours of the historic building, and a presentation on the Naval Operating Base history, and its history after WWII.

Project significance: Sitka's Japonski Island Boathouse is a contributing structure of the Sitka Naval

Operating Base and U.S. Army Coastal Defenses National Historic Landmark. This Landmark is significant for the important role it played when the United States entered World War II, when this Naval Air Station was the only fully operational military defense installation in Alaska. It is locally significant as a reminder of how the build up for WWII transformed Alaska and brought attention, and population, to this sleepy fishing town. After the war, when the military installations became the now-vanished federal community of Mt. Edgecumbe, the Boathouse has iconic stature as the place where the "Shore Boats," the ferries connecting Mt. Edgecumbe to the town on Sitka, were repaired and maintained for three decades.

The building is one of the last wooden working waterfront structures in Sitka, and one of the few remaining wooden structures in the NHL, and the only one that is undergoing restoration. As such it has great value as an icon of Sitka's maritime history.

The Boathouse is owned by the City and Borough of Sitka, and leased for restoration and operation by the Sitka Maritime Heritage Society. The SMHS instigated its transfer from the state of Alaska to the City and Borough for this purpose.

Previous HPF grants: A 2003 CLG grant was for a structural survey and hazardous materials survey, and a 2004 CLG grant was used for a conceptual architectural design for rehabilitation. The SMHS won and utilized a HPF grant for cleaning, inventory, and painting in 2005, and for replacing the building's foundation in 2006.

A CLG grant in 2013 was used for restoring all of the building's windows and for electrical wiring by a contractor. In 2016 we completed a CLG grant-funded project to repair all of the doors in the building and to relocate an outbuilding in preparation for the new addition. A CLG grant awarded in 2017 is now under way, to build the concrete stem wall for this addition, and to bring utilities inside the building.

Previous HPF projects the grant manager has worked on: The project manager, Rebecca Poulson, worked on all the previous HPF projects at the Boathouse, as well as four projects for the Sitka Fine Arts Camp on the Sheldon Jackson School National Historic Landmark.

Relation to past and future work: To date, the SMHS has stabilized and painted the building; restored the foundation; replaced the roof; and we have complete, approved construction documents for historic rehabilitation. Contents of the building have been inventoried and stored on site. All the building's windows have been restored, and the main workshop now has power and lights. Most recently all of the historic doors have been repaired, and a small outbuilding has been moved away from the main structure, to make room for the new addition.

In 2017 the gable wall was repaired, the existing winch shed documented and removed. Currently under way, contractors will be installing utilities and building a concrete stem wall for this addition for accessible entry and toilet.

Adding an addition with accessible entry and toilet and utilities is neccessary and essential to the architectural plans for rehabilitation and reuse. The building is not useable without adding a toilet, and a heated space for hook-ups for utilities, including the sprinkler riser. Originally, the building had a toilet on the water side of the building, with an outfall to the beach, which is obviously not an option any more! Heat formerly came from a central power plant. The original electric service was not up to

current standards.

The architectural plans call for putting utilities in an addition, that can be heated separately, so that the rest of the space can go unheated if needed. Putting an accessible toilet elsewhere in the building is not practical.

The addition will also have an accessible ramp and a small office/lobby space, which is needed for the building's new use as a public maritime heritage center. The addition will allow full use of the building, which is not possible now, without running water or bathroom. Currently we are limited to holding events of short duration, or renting Porta Potties, which are not accessible. The building itself is not currently accessible to people in wheelchairs.

We have applied for a National Park Service Maritime Heritage Preservation grant, and we are in the midst of a fundraising campaign, to prepare the east wing for the public use, with electric wiring and heat.

This work is also part of a strategy to continue building public awareness and appreciation of history and historic preservation, which we do by holding regular events at the Boathouse and in the community of maritime oral history and education.

Intended audience: Our intended audience for the project is primarily the residents of Sitka, but we are also reaching out to visitors, and to the wider world of those interested in maritime heritage, through the web.

The overall rehabilitation is to make the building a maritime heritage center, where we will preserve and educate the public about maritime history and culture, and preserve and teach maritime skills.

This particular project will not only contribute to making the building fully functional, but through the public work parties and coverage in social media, on our website, and radio and newspaper announcements, will educate local residents about historic preservation methods and goals.

2. PRESERVATION OBJECTIVES

Annual CLG priorities: This project meets goal number 1., "projects that increase public awareness of historic preservation... and produce educational materials emphasizing historic preservation" by putting on public work parties, which will be promoted locally and on the web.

Goal #2. "Projects that address the rehabilitation of historic properties and leverage funds and resources. Restoring and preserving defining elements of historic properties, and addressing sustainability." This project leverages SMHS funds and volunteers, and the goal of the project is to enable a new, compatible use of this historic building that will ensure sustainability.

State Historic Preservation Plan: The project contributes to the goals and objectives of the State Historic Preservation Plan in that it works towards improving awareness of and access to historic preservation information, encourages the promotion of historic preservation, promotes local preservation efforts to maintain and enhance our community's character, and encourages the appropriate treatment of historic resources.

Identified priorities of our community: This project meets and contributes to the following identified

community priorities of the City of Sitka as listed in the 2007 City and Borough of Sitka, Alaska Comprehensive Plan Update, as it is an element of the overall development and rehabilitation of the Japonski Island Boathouse as a WWII and Maritime History Interpretive Center. These priorities in particular apply to this project:

2.4 General Land Use Goals & Priorities (p.16-19)

The City and Borough shall encourage the preservations, renovation and interpretation of buildings and sites related to World War II activities within the Sitka road system, the surrounding islands and remote locations within the Borough. (p.18)

- 2.6. Urban Commercial and Industrial Goals and Policies (p.20-21)
- 2.6.4. To encourage preservation/restoration of historic architecture and landmarks that may be affected for commercial and industrial use. (p.21)
- 2.12. Arts and Culture Goals and Policies (p.28-29)
- 2.12.2. To maintain and develop ongoing programs devoted to supporting Sitka's artists, students, educators, historians and Native elders in both the development and preservation of their important work. (p.28)
- 2.12.3. To continue support of the Arts in the following ways: Assure protection and enhancement of historic places including, but not limited to, cemeteries, historic buildings, landmarks, and public art. (p.29)
- 2.12.5. To provide facilities for arts and culture through: Supporting the maintenance and the staffing of such facilities. (p.29)
- 2.13. Historical and Cultural Facilities (p.34)
 - a.i. To preserve and appreciate Sitka's heritage. Sites or structures having significant historic or cultural value should be preserved.

In addition, the community of Sitka has been working, through the City government, the Sitka Convention and Visitor Bureau, and various nonprofits, to market Sitka as an Arts and Culture destination, highlighting our historic architecture, culture and history. This has resulted in Sitka's designation as a *National Trust for Historic Preservation Distinctive Destination* in 2012, and the Alaska Tourism Association annual meeting in 2013, The Fine Art of Tourism, hosted on the Sheldon Jackson School National Historic Landmark.

Local Historic Preservation Plan: The project supports both Purpose, #3: "to encourage local support of historic preservation" and Goals, #5: "To increase public awareness and appreciation of historical preservation in the City and Borough of Sitka."

Both of these are met by this project, a highly visible project that will have public presentations and publicity.

3. PROJECT LOCATION

This proposed project will take place at the Japonski Island Marine Ways, 1490 Seward Street, Sitka, Alaska. All work will take place in, on or adjacent to the building. (Map and site plan attached)

4. WORK PLAN

Explain how the work will be accomplished. Even before the grant is awarded, we will submit the project to the State Office of Historic Preservation for review per Section 106 of the NHPA. The property already has a historic covenant, which we will extend if appropriate.

We already have a building permit for the entire addition, which we received in 2017 for the foundation and utility work. Upon award of the grant, we will solicit proposals for building the addition shell. We will begin planning and scheduling volunteer work parties to repair the wall where the deck is attached, and, once the shell is complete, to build the deck, stairs and ramp. We will order if necessary or buy materials we will need (such as stainless fasteners).

All work will be in accordance with the Secretary of the Interior's Standards for the Treatment of Historic Properties, 1995, Standards for Rehabilitation. It will all be to the detailed construction drawings for the rehabilitation by NorthWind Architects, which have been approved by the SHPO. Part of the construction of the addition shell is to cover the wall above the addition with 1/2-inch plywood, and new siding to match the original.

Any new siding will be fabricated from Number One Douglas fir or western red cedar, which will look like the original, clear Douglas fir siding.

We already have the roofing and roof insulation and fasteners and gutters, purchased as part of the replacement of the roof on the existing building.

The siding on the building is actually ship-lap sheathing, which has been applied to the building as if it were clapboard. In some parts of the building, such as this west wall, most of it is applied flat, like sheathing.

Work schedule. All of the work will happen through the spring, summer and fall months of 2018, starting with soliciting proposals, choosing a contractor, and the contractor phase, building the shell and adding layer to the gable above the addition.

This will be followed by volunteer repair of the wall where it will be covered by the new deck. Then, volunteers will construct the deck and ramp.

On completion of the work, we will hold a public event at the Boathouse to promote and celebrate the project, with tours and a display and presentation of the history of the Naval Operating Base and its post-war history for the federal Public Health Service and Bureau of Indian Affairs.

Planning studies, research reports or publications, or other sources of information relevant to the proposed project. We have complete construction documents for rehabilitation of the Boathouse, by NorthWind architects, approved by the State Historic Preservation Office. They were also reviewed by the National Park Service.

All work will follow the *The Secretary of the Interior's Standards for the Treatment of Historic Properties, 1995,* Standards for Rehabilitation. Other resources on historic preservation and repair will be consulted, compiled, and shared with participants as appropriate, including National Park Service Preservation Briefs.

We also have historical photographic documentation, in particular images from during WWII and a photograph from a survey in 1966.

We also have oral history interviews with the sons and daughters of the man who ran the facility in the

1960s, 70s and 80s, and with others who worked there. In addition, we have documents from the National Archives related to this facility.

5. PROJECT PERSONNEL

Personnel Sitka Maritime Heritage Society Executive Director Dr. Jenya Anitchenko will manage the overall project, submitting quarterly reports and tracking expenditures.

Contract

Attached is the resume for Construction Manager and volunteer coordinator Anthony Vlahovich. Anthony will be in charge of the volunteer work on the building, and he will also be the inspector on the contractor's work on the addition. Both are deeply qualified in historic preservation work.

Selection of the contractor who will build the addition foundation will be reviewed by the SHPO. The SMHS will advertise for proposals, per City and Borough of Sitka requirements we need three proposals and have to take the least expensive, but we will make the criteria explicit enough that the contractor will be qualified for this kind of work. The chosen contractor will be made familiar if they aren't already with the Secretary of the Interior's Standards for the Treatment of Historic Properties.

Local government personnel will be the City and Borough of Sitka Grant Accountant, who will review and submit quarterly reports on behalf of the SMHS.

The Sitka Historic Preservation Commission reviews Certified Local Government grant applications. The Commission has been enthusiastically supportive of the work on the Japonski Island Boathouse since it first began. The SMHS also presents regular progress reports to the commission.

Volunteer personnel Attached is a resume for Rebecca Poulson, who will oversee the overall project, and ensure compliance with federal historic preservation standards.

Dr. Brinnen Carter, Chief of Resources at the Sitka National Historical Park has worked extensively with historic preservation projects with the National Park Service. He will create a plan for the volunteer work on the building.

Other volunteers will come from the SMHS membership and the public, and include professional carpenters and builders. They will be trained in historic preservation methods as they are overseen by Anthony Vlahovich.







Above, west (rear) elevation, after the outbuilding was relocated. 10/1/17.








Above, north side (before removal of addition). 7/30/16.

Below, the primary, East, elevation. 7/30/16.


