2. CALL TO ORDER

The meeting was called to order at 6:00 p.m.

by School Board President Phil Burdick in the
Sitka High School Library.

In attendance were board members Courtney Amundson, Paul Rioux, Amanda Williams, Tom Williams, President Phil Burdick, and Student Representative Francis Myers. The meeting was quorate.

6. APPROVAL OF THE PROPOSED AGENDA AND CONSENT AGENDA

Mr. Williams moved, and **Ms. Williams** seconded to approve the proposed agenda and consent agenda, as presented.

The motion PASSED without opposition.

7. PERSONS TO BE HEARD

Former SSD Business Manager, **Leslie Young**, spoke to the board regarding a possible misuse of the district's Alaska

Airlines mileage account and credit card during her tenure.

8. **GOVERNMENT TO GOVERNMENT**

There was no Government to Government report at this meeting.

9. **SCHOOL HIGHLIGHTS – PHS**

Matt Groen, Principal of Pacific High School, gave a presentation to the board of programs and activities at Pacific High School.

10. **BOARD MEMBER REPORTS**

President Burdick shared his board related activities from October, including attending the State Board of Education meeting regarding local contributions, a family engagement coffee chat, and a legislative education task force. He reported to the City Assembly on district matters, and shared feedback regarding the board retreat with AASB.

Mr. Williams shared his own reflections on the board retreat.

Mr. Rioux reported on Policy Committee work and expressed that he thought the time spent at the board retreat was time well spent. In his role with AASB, Mr. Rioux had the opportunity to attend the AASB/ALASBO maintenance conference.

Ms. Williams gave a report on the October Policy Committee meeting, sharing that the committee is continuing discussions around updating district board policies, including the district's policies around head lice and administering medication. She also reported that she attended two KGH parent advisory committee (SHIP) meetings – one regarding Title 1 funding, and another regarding math instruction.

Ms. Amundson shared that she was sworn in as a board member at the October 15th special meeting. She has been occupied with reading board bylaws and learning about Roberts Rules of Order.

Mr. Myers reported on ongoing activities at Sitka High School. He share that Sitka sent a student delegation to the AASG state conference, bringing three resolutions for adoption, including one regarding chronic absenteeism, and one addressing statewide underfunding of major maintenance in school districts.

11. SUPERINTENDENT REPORT

a. ENROLLMENT SUMMARY

Superintendent Jenson reported that the Fall OASIS report is nearly complete. District enrollment is currently 1,027 (1047 less 20 PreK students). Average Daily Membership stands at 1028.76, but the final count won't be verified until December. The district budgeted for 1,000 students this year; the number of students over 1,000 will bring approximately \$180,000 into the district's general fund. The board was provided with the monthly revenue/expenditures report from the Business Office.

b. FINANCE REPORT

Dr. Jenson's update included the following:

c. SUPERINTENDENT UPDATE

- Professional Development – administrators and district office staff attended continuing Leadership Paradigm training in Anchorage.
- The data work session and retreat with the board provided an opportunity for relationship building.
- Grant work – applying for a farm to table grant to continue the PHS garden project. Project Achieve grant – meeting with district high schools to develop post-secondary plans.
- Sitka Conservation Society is hiring a part time person to work with students in the garden and to support the SSD foods program with indigenous foods.
- The district has not yet received word on the school safety grant due to the government shutdown.

- Dr. Jenson met with city department personnel to begin work on Emergency Operations plan.

12. NEW BUSINESS

Other Discussion:

Hayley White and Jeanine Brooks spoke to the committee regarding the head lice protocol currently being practiced in schools. They gave recommendations to the committee for revisions to the current administrative regulation in the district policy manual to align more with the currently practiced protocol. The committee agreed to move the AR from BP 5112.2 – Exclusions from Attendance to BP 5141 – Health Care and Emergencies. It will be renamed AR 5141.1 Pediculosis – Head Lice. An exhibit to the AR will be created as an educational piece by the district nurse, and will be presented to the committee in December.

ALASKA PERFORMANCE SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM

AR 5128(a)

The Alaska Performance Scholarship Program provides scholarships for high school graduates who are Alaska residents to attend a qualified postsecondary institution in the State of Alaska. The district is required to determine student eligibility for the three levels of scholarships available. The district must then notify the Alaska Department of Education and Early Development of each qualifying student's eligibility.

Eligibility Determinations

The principal or designee of each high school shall determine scholarship eligibility for each graduating student by application of the following criteria.

A. Course Work Requirements

Note: The following curriculum requirements are in place for students graduating from high school in and after 2024. Qualifying units of credit shall include a student's completion of a high school level course in an earlier grade if: 1) the course meets content standards for a grade 9-12 course; 2) is within a qualifying curriculum (math, science, language arts, etc.); and 3) appears on the student's high school transcript. A course does not satisfy the requirements of this section, regardless of the course name unless it is: 1) a college or industry preparatory course; and 2) meets or exceeds the standards and grade level expectations in *Alaska Standards: Content and Performance Standards for Alaska Students*. An advanced placement and international baccalaureate course meets curriculum requirements and is considered an approved course as fully stated in 4 AAC 43.030.

The Alaska Performance Scholarship may be awarded based on a student's completion of either a math and science curriculum track, or a social studies and language curriculum track.

Curriculum Requirements

Graduating students in 2024 and beyond must meet the following curriculum requirements to qualify for all scholarship levels (Achievement, Performance, and Honors):

Math and Science Curriculum:

1. Math – 4 units of credit, consisting of either four units selected from the following courses or a combination of three units selected from the following courses and an additional course approved by the department:
 - i. algebra I;
 - ii. algebra II;
 - iii. geometry;
 - iv. trigonometry;
 - v. pre-calculus;
 - vi. calculus;
 - vii. calculus II;
 - viii. statistics.

AR 5128(b)

2. Science – 4 units of credit, consisting of either four units selected from the following courses or a combination of two units selected from the following courses and two additional courses approved by the department:
 - i. physical science;
 - ii. earth science;
 - iii. biology;
 - iv. chemistry;
 - v. physics;
 - vi. marine biology;
 - vii. anatomy and physiology.
3. Language arts – 4 units of credit, consisting of either four units selected from the following courses or a combination of three units selected from the following courses and an additional course approved by the department:
 - i. composition;
 - ii. American literature;
 - iii. world literature;
 - iv. speech and debate;
 - v. advanced composition;
 - vi. creative writing;
 - vii. British literature.
4. Social studies – 4 units of credit, one unit of credit in a foreign or Alaska Native language, fine arts, or cultural heritage may substitute for one of the four units of credit of social studies; at least two units of credit must be from the following courses, with any remaining credits from courses approved by the department:
 - i. World history;
 - ii. American history;
 - iii. geography;
 - iv. American government/civics;
 - v. economics;
 - vi. Alaska history;
 - vii. western or eastern civilization;
 - viii. psychology;
 - ix. sociology.

Social Studies and Language Curriculum

1. Math - 3 units of credit, consisting of either three units selected from the following courses or a combination of two units selected from the following courses and an additional course approved by the department:
 - i. algebra I;
 - ii. algebra II;
 - iii. geometry;
 - iv. trigonometry;

- v. pre-calculus;
- vi. calculus;
- vii. calculus II;
- viii. statistics.

2. Science – 3 units of credit consisting of either three units selected from the following courses or a combination of two units selected from the following courses and an additional course approved by the department:
 - i. physical science;
 - ii. earth science;
 - iii. biology;
 - iv. chemistry;
 - v. physics;
 - vi. marine biology;
 - vii. anatomy and physiology;
3. Language arts – 4 units of credit consisting of either four units selected from the following courses or a combination of three units selected from the following courses and an additional course approved by the department:
 - i. composition;
 - ii. American literature;
 - iii. world literature;
 - iv. speech and debate;
 - v. advanced composition;
 - vi. creative writing;
 - vii. British literature;
4. Social studies – 4 units of credit, consisting of either four units selected from the following courses or a combination of three units selected from the following courses and an additional course approved by the department:
 - i. world history;
 - ii. American history;
 - iii. geography;
 - iv. American government/civics;
 - v. economics;
 - vi. Alaska history;
 - vii. western or eastern civilization;
 - viii. psychology;
 - ix. sociology.
5. Foreign, Alaska Native or American sign language – 2 units of credit in the same language.

AR 5128(d)

Note: A district that offers courses meeting the requirements for APS but that do not clearly fall within the course names found above may seek approval from the Department to have those courses approved for APS purposes. 4 AAC 43.030(j).

B. Grade Point Average and Standardized Examination Scores

In addition to the curriculum requirements above, students must meet certain GPA or standardized examination score requirements. It is the student's responsibility to provide proof of results achieved on one of the standardized examinations required for scholarship eligibility. GPA or test scores determine a student's level of eligibility for each of the three scholarships set forth below:

1. Alaska Performance Honors Scholarship

Grade Point Average: 3.5 or higher

or

Test Scores: ACT composite score of 25 or higher; or
SAT combined score of 1210 or higher; or
A combined WorkKeys score of 18 or higher, with no single score lower than 6, in each of the following:

1. applied mathematics
2. reading for information
3. locating information

Note: The Alaska Performance Honors Scholarship has an award level of \$7,000.

2. Alaska Performance Achievement Scholarship

Grade Point Average: 3.0 or higher

or

Test Scores: ACT composite score of 23 or higher; or
SAT combined score of 1130 or higher; or
A combined WorkKeys score of 15 or higher, with no single score lower than 5, in each of the following:

1. applied mathematics
2. reading for information
3. locating information

ALASKA PERFORMANCE SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM (continued)

AR 5128(e)

Note: The Alaska Performance Achievement Scholarship has an award level of \$5,250.

3. Alaska Performance Opportunity Scholarship

Grade Point Average: 2.5 or higher

or

Test Scores: ACT composite score of 21 or higher; or
SAT combined score of 1060 or higher; or
A combined WorkKeys score of 12 or higher, with no single
score lower than 4, in each of the following:

1. applied mathematics
2. reading for information
3. locating information

Note: The Alaska Performance Opportunity Scholarship has an award level of \$3,500.

Note: A student who qualifies for one of the above scholarships using the WorkKeys examination must use the scholarship award in a career and technical program that results in the award of a certificate. 4 AAC 43.020(d).
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Notice to Parents/Guardians of Eligibility Determination

Option 1:

The principal or designee shall provide written notice to all parents/guardians, or to students if 18 or older, of the eligibility determination, or how they may learn the eligibility determination. The notice should also explain how a parent/guardian or eligible student may challenge this determination.

Permanent Record

Once eligibility levels are determined, the district will record the level of eligibility on each qualifying student's permanent record. No notation should be made for those students who are not eligible for a scholarship award.

Annual Transmittal of Records

No later than July 15 of each year, the district will transmit an electronic version of each graduating student's permanent record that describes the student's eligibility for the Alaska Performance Scholarship Program. This is a mandatory reporting obligation and parents/students may not opt out of this disclosure.

ALASKA PERFORMANCE SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM (continued)

AR 5128(f)

Appeal Procedures

The district provides the following appeal process for students who believe an error has been made regarding a student's eligibility for an Alaska Performance Scholarship. A student can request that the district review the determination of whether or not he or she is eligible or, if eligible, the level of scholarship available.

A. Appeal Form

To request an appeal, a student must complete the Alaska Performance Scholarship Appeal Form for Public School Students. [E 5128] The form requires:

1. Name, mailing address, and contact information;
2. Eligibility information in the form of official examination scores and an official transcript indicating courses taken and GPA and/or test scores;
3. A statement explaining why the student believes the eligibility determination is in error; and
4. All documents, papers, or other materials that support a reversal or modification of the eligibility determination.

Students who have questions about the form or require assistance should contact a counselor or principal at the student's high school.

Students must complete the Appeal Form and provide supporting documents as soon as possible after receiving notice of his or her eligibility determination. No appeals will be considered unless submitted within thirty (30) days of receiving the district's eligibility determination, absent unusual circumstances that prevented a timely appeal.

B. Appeal Process

1. Student submits the completed Appeal Form and supporting documentation to _____ [identify appropriate school official to process appeals].
2. The district will designate a reviewer to review and decide the appeal.
3. The reviewer will consider all information submitted and issue a determination of whether or not the student meets scholarship eligibility, and if eligible, the student's level of eligibility.
4. The reviewer's determination is the final decision of the district.
5. Notice of the district's decision will be sent to the student no later than thirty (30) days after the student submits a timely appeal.
6. If the reviewer determines that scholarship eligibility was incorrect, the district will notify the Alaska Performance Scholarship Program of the correct eligibility determination and revise the student's transcript to correctly identify APS eligibility.

ALASKA PERFORMANCE SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAM (continued)

AR 5128(g)

Note: Effective June 6, 2015 the regulation providing for a grace period and waiver of curriculum requirements was repealed and a new section added to provide for students to request a scholarship eligibility extension. 4 AAC 43.035 (repealed); 4 AAC 43.045 (extensions of eligibility period). An extension of scholarship eligibility does not permit a student to receive a scholarship for more semester hours than is permitted under AS 14.43.825.

Extension of Scholarship Eligibility

The district should notify appropriate students about the availability of a scholarship eligibility extension that may be granted by the Alaska Commissioner of Education. Upon request, the Commissioner may grant a student who has previously been determined eligible for a scholarship under APS, a scholarship eligibility extension. Such an extension allows a student to remain eligible for a scholarship for longer than six years after the date of the student's graduation from high school.

To qualify for an extension of scholarship eligibility, a student must:

1. Submit a written request to the Commissioner *no later than* 30 days before the student's period of scholarship eligibility under 14.43.825(b) is set to expire; and
2. Submit with the request a signed statement from the institution of higher learning in which the student is admitted or enrolled attesting that the student has experienced or is experiencing an enrollment delay due to the availability of coursework required by the degree program the student is pursuing, and that the enrollment delay is beyond the student's control.

Professional Development: (Strategic Plan Strategy 4: We will produce a Professional Development/Mentorship/Induction program for SSD staff.)

- Our business office team is going to the ALASBO (Alaska Association of School Business Officials) Conference in Anchorage December 7th-10th. Prior to that is the NMBI (New Business Manager Institute) preconference, which is a two or three-year course (depending on business experience) for new school officials. Our business manager enrolled in this when we hired her; she will be finishing this course towards the end of this year.

Survey for Families: (Strategy 5: We will develop an internal and external District communication plan.)

- The administrative team is finalizing a short family survey (approximately 15 easy questions) with the purpose of gathering feedback our recent work and possible changes or improvements such as PreK programming, the new food service program, all-day kindergarten, information access, grading, school pictures, federal programs, and the Ventures program. We plan to get this out to families and staff prior to the winter break - be watching for that.

Post-Secondary Planning: (Strategy 1: We will Identify strategies to close learning gaps. 2. We will Strengthen culturally responsive programing. Strategy 3: We will Expand and strengthen partnerships. Strategy 5: We will develop an internal and external District communication plan. Strategy 6: We will expand opportunities and remove participation barriers for students.)

- We have been developing our vision as well as a plan on how to improve post-secondary planning for our students. We are looking at adopting a couple of different programs to assist in tracking student progress as well as giving the students and families tools for exploration, information, and task tracking. We are engaging in conversations with other grant funding but also plan on using our Project Achieve grant to support this much needed endeavor.

Pre-K: (Strategy 1: We will Identify strategies to close learning gaps. Strategy 6: We will expand opportunities and remove participation barriers for students.)

- Childcare continues to be a topic of discussion in Sitka. I made site visits to many of our preschool sites in the last two weeks to share our progress, ask them about their current challenges, and continue planning for the upcoming years.
- One topic of discussion is the .5 ADM (Average Daily Membership) we *could* apply for. Considerations or questions include, but are not limited to: will we be able to have a balanced budget if we do; if we apply for .5 ADM, do we need to offer it to all students

or can we continue with 20 students? and if so, does that hold significant implications for other agencies as well as our spatial capacity? and do we have staff capacity to meet the rigorous DEED requirements?

- Another point of conversation focuses on supporting training for staff as well as ensuring their retention in the program.

Risk Assessment Team: (Strategy 5: We will develop an internal and external District communication plan. Strategy 6: We will expand opportunities and remove participation barriers for students.)

- We have been developing Risk Assessment Teams. Approximately 85% of schools across the nation and approximately 15% of Alaska schools have an established team such as this. Each building will have its own team as well as a District Office team. This process is a multidisciplinary, preventive school safety team that identifies, evaluates, and addresses risk or potential risks to students, staff, or the school environment. The team typically including administrators, mental-health staff, teachers, and possibly law enforcement or other appropriate agencies, uses a structured, proactive process to distinguish between actual and non-credible threats and to connect students to appropriate supports rather than relying on punitive responses. Its purpose is to prevent violence and ensure safety through coordinated assessment, intervention, and follow-up.
- A related vein of work is about our tracking and logging of behaviors in PowerSchool to improve communication with parents and between schools as students move through the Pre-K-12 system.

SUBJECT: Replacement of Theatrical Lighting Control System at Performing Arts Center (PAC)

SSD STRATEGY 3: We will expand and strengthen partnerships.

RECOMMENDED ACTION: The Sitka School Board will request that the City of Sitka Assembly add replacing the Performing Arts Center theatrical lighting control system to the 2025 CIP maintenance list and receive supplemental funding for replacement.

PERTINENT FACTS:

- Sitka Fine Arts Camp (SFAC) operates the PAC under an agreement with the Sitka School District (SSD). The PAC is one of the buildings that was to be included in the CIP process in FY26, but input from SFAC was not included in the capital needs of the PAC. Because of that, this project needs consideration for supplemental appropriation.
- This is an *urgent* project identified by SFAC staff and directors. SFAC staff have previously consulted with the city maintenance team on the issue.
- If approved for supplemental appropriation by the Assembly, the funds would be allocated from the schools infrastructure fund ahead of the FY27 CIP approval. This would allow the project to be completed sooner rather than later.
- The theatrical lighting system at the Performing Arts Center is experiencing progressive, irrevocable failure. A significant percentage of the system is no longer functional, affecting both the control of all lights and the operation of individual lighting units.
- The current system, installed in 2006, operates on a proprietary computer platform that has been unsupported since 2010—two years after the theater opened.
- Technicians must currently use a 3.5" floppy disk to reboot the system. Rebooting has become increasingly unreliable, and after a full reboot, several critical functions did not restore properly.
- Sitka Fine Arts engaged a regional BLS technician licensed to service and install ETC lighting systems, which serve 99% of theaters in the U.S.
- After a full-day assessment, the technician confirmed that restoring full functionality is not possible without replacing the main operating system and several failed inline units. The assessment reinforced that the system could fail completely in the near future.
- The BLS quote identifies several replacement options:
 - Base Bid: \$77,688
 - Alternate #1 (Ion Control Board): \$27,386
 - Additional Costs: 2–3 days of licensed electrician labor
- The estimated total replacement cost is approximately \$125,000.
- If the current system crashes again and cannot reboot, the Performing Arts Center will be nonfunctional, as the lighting system controls all stage and audience chamber lights.

SUBJECT: Approval of Matching Funds for FY26 Farm to School Grant

SSD Strategy #1: Identify strategies to close learning gaps

SSD Strategy #5: Develop internal and external District communication plans

RECOMMENDATION: Approve matching funds up to \$165,000 from the Food Service Program Budget to support the FY26 Farm to School Grant application, meeting the required 25% non-federal match.

- **PERTINENT FACTS:**
The FY26 Patrick Leahy Farm to School Grant requires a minimum 25% non-federal match.
- SSD anticipates a federal request in the range that requires a local match of approximately \$165,000 (not to exceed this amount).
- Matching funds would come from the Food Service Program, which already exceeds this level of annual expenditure and does not receive sufficient revenue from the National School Lunch Program to cover full program costs.
- Using Food Service Program funds as the match aligns with USDA requirements and supports expansion of local food sourcing, agricultural education, and farm-to-school initiatives.
- Approval of matching funds strengthens SSD's competitiveness for the grant and supports long-term goals related to nutrition, food systems education, and local partnerships.
